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Pre-amble

According to the NHS 2018 Excellence in Continence Care report, it is estimated that more than 50% of care home residents have urinary incontinence. People living in care homes are entitled to the same access and level of NHS services as those living in their own homes. Care homes and commissioners should collaborate with each other to ensure adequate provision and funding of products.

Please, therefore, accept this data request under the Freedom of Information Act as a Freedom of Information Request. This request seeks to collect data regarding your Integrated Care Board's (ICBs) continence provision.

Please note: if the service you offer differs between residential and nursing care homes, please clearly address this in your response to the questions below. If prior to ICB formation, the former CCGs had different processes and, these have not changed and the ICB has multiple processes across the ICB, please make sure this is reflected in your response below.

Q1) Continence care is free at the point of access. We are aware former CCGs used to offer either a weekly payment to care providers to fund the purchase of continence aids (i.e pads) themselves or in some cases free issued continence aids (i.e. pads) to care home residents via the local continence service. The ICB currently funds continence products by a consumable budget held and manged by Sirona care and health CIC, our community services provider. The community provider will assess for and prescribe clinically appropriate continence products where indicated wherever they reside in BNSSG (Bristol, North Somerset and South Gloucestershire). This was reviewed as part of the original contract design process.
