2024/25. Contract monitoring data submitted to the ICB by this provider shows that they received a total of approximately 606 referrals during the 4 months following the contract award until 31st March 2025, split as 291 for adults and 315 for Children & Young People.

For the period 1^{st} December $2024-31^{st}$ March 2025, the spend with Clinical Partners was £85,856 across Children & Young People and Adult ADHD.

Question 2d:

Please see table below for details of spend. This information is provided with the following conditions:

1. Some of the providers listed offer both ADHD and Autism services and due to the way invoices have historically been processed, spend in these areas up to September 2024 was applied to the same invoicing budget code. It would not be possible to retrospectively split out ADHD only costs as far back as 2022-23 within the 18 hour response timeframe, however any providers of Autism only services have been removed from the list.



- d) The total amounts paid by the ICB to non-NHS (private) providers of ADHD diagnosis for each of the financial years: 2022/23, 2023/24, 2024/25, broken down according to each non- NHS (private) provider organisation.
- 2. Furthermore, where a non-NHS (private) provider offers both ADHD and Autism assessment services it can be common for them to consolidate all activity onto one single invoice. While all reasonable steps have been taken to separate ADHD from Autism spend since September 2024, it is possible that the ADHD spend figure will still include some Autism activity, particularly where a provider offers combined assessments.
- 3. The information supplied will include all pathway costs including assessment, post diagnostic support, follow up appointments, medication costs etc. This is because many providers consolidate all charges onto the same invoice.
- Please note that some of the providers listed are private pharmacies used by ADHD providers for prescription of medication and would not provide any other diagnostic or treatment function.
