<p>Please provide in full any analysis carried out, in 2024-25 and 2025-26, by your respective ICBs on block contracts for non-elective care, which compare the 'fixed elements' payments to what they would have been on a price x activity basis.</p> <p>The information I'm looking for includes, but is <b><u>not limited to</u></b>, the ICB's responses to requests from NHS England for all commissioners to review current block contracts on an Activity X Price (PbR) basis.</p> <p>Please provide data on what the 'fixed element' payments were in 2024-25 and 2025-26, and what they would have been on a price per activity basis, according to the analysis. Break this information down by specialty if this information is available.</p>	<p>The ICB has applied Section 43(2) to this information. Section 42(2) exempts from disclosure information which would, or would be likely to, prejudice the commercial interests of any legal person (an individual, a company, the public authority itself, or any other legal entity). Section 43(2) is a qualified exemption and therefore subject to the public interest test.</p> <p>The public interest argument in favour of disclosing the information includes the ICB's responsibility to be transparent and accountable in its decision making processes and to promote public understanding of processes.</p> <p>The public interest argument in favour of maintaining the exemption includes the ICB's responsibility to secure the best use of public resources and provide value for money. The requested analysis carried out on the block contracts underpins the basis of these ICB contracts and if disclosed would reduce the ICB's ability to negotiate. There are robust commissioning processes in place to ensure that the ICB commissions services which are value for money and competitive.</p>
