Please provide the following information regarding the management of patients with learning disabilities (LD) within the ICB footprint for the 2024 and 2025 financial year.	
1. Annual Health Checks (AHC): What was the percentage of patients on the GP LD Register in this ICB received a completed AHC and a resulting Health Action Plan?	As of 31/3/2025: 78.24% of people of the GP LD register in BNSSG received a completed AHC. The 78.24% of people who received a AHC - 97.15% also received a health action plan.
2. Health Inequalities Funding: What was the total ICB budget specifically allocated to reducing health inequalities for people with LD (under the Core20PLUS5 framework)?	There are a range of services commissioned via the Contracts for Community services intended to reduce health inequalities for people with LD (under the Core20PLUS5 framework). Since these services exist as a part of a block contract, the ICB is unable to indicate the value of budget assigned for this purpose.
3. Dynamic Support Register (DSR): How many individuals are currently on the ICB's DSR and what percentage of those have had a multi-disciplinary review in the last 6 months?	The ICB does not currently hold an all age DSR, this is in progress and anticipated to go live in September 2026. Adults: There is no DSR for over 18's in BNSSG (Bristol, North Somerset and South Gloucestershire).

Under 18's

The ICB has a DSR with limited capability for children and young people (CYP) under the age of 18 with a Learning Disability and/or Autism in BNSSG. Currently, the under 18's DSR is 'single agency', whereby only professionals from Avon and Wiltshire Partnership CAMHS Service can add a name to the register. At this time, there are 147 children and young people on the CAMHS DSR, rag rated as 'red' i.e. most at risk of a CAMHS inpatient admission.

From an ICB perspective, in the past 6 months; 9 x young people have had Care, Education and Treatment Reviews and 5 x have had Local Area Emergency Protocol meetings. In addition to this, the top 20 children and young people most at risk of admission are reviewed in the monthly multiagency DSR tracking meeting 'Complex Needs Group'.

Due to the nature and complexity of each of the 147 children and young people on the DSR, their needs will all have routinely been reviewed in various MDT (Multi-Disciplinary Team) forums-

- From a Social Care Perspective either at a Team around the Family, Child in Need, Child Protection or Child in Care Review
- From an education perspective, at an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) review
- And from a Mental Health perspective, at a Care Programme Approach meeting

4. STOMP/STAMP: Please provide the total number of patients with an LD diagnosis who are currently prescribed antipsychotic medication without a corresponding mental health diagnosis. Clarification received: I can confirm that the list of antipsychotic medications of particular interest are: Haloperidol Risperidone Olanzapine Quetiapine	Data held shows that as of 10/03/2025: 270 patients on the GP Learning Disability register (excluding those on the severe mental illness register) received a prescription for oral antipsychotic medication (excluding prochlorperazine, levomepromazine and depot forms) in the last calendar month <i>and</i> at least once in the previous 3 months, OR received a depot antipsychotic in the last calendar month or any of the previous 3 months.
5. Reconciliation: Does the ICB perform a formal data reconciliation between Hospital Episode Statistics (HES) and GP AHC data to identify patients who are frequently admitted but not receiving community health checks?	No, the ICB does not receive HES data as it is not one of the commissioning data sets.
